ROAMY'S STORY



In April of 2013, we received a call from a shelter in West Virginia. It had picked up a male golden retriever; he and his family were homeless and had been living on the streets. I don't think I was prepared for what I was about to see and something I don't think I'll forget.

Roamy had very little fur on his entire body; his skin was raw and sore and the odor from the skin infection was very overpowering. He had a green puss material coming from both of his eyes and was having difficulty opening his eyes because of the infection. I don't think there was an inch of this poor dog that was normal. Both of Roamy's ears were infected from years of chronic ear infections that had never been treated. Roamy went immediately to our Vet for treatment. It was evident after several courses of antibiotics that one of his ears was not responding to any medication. We had to do something for him; we knew he was in pain due to the ear not responding to anything the

Vet had given him. The decision was made to surgically remove his ear canal in January of 2014. We were told that this surgery had several risks, but we decided that anything was better than watching him be in constant pain the rest of his life. At this point we didn't realize there would be more surgeries to come for this sweet boy.

During all the medical issues, we found out he had food allergies and Roamy needed to eat a special food to keep him from itching and scratching constantly.

In the meantime, while he was recovering, Kay Hirsch found him a foster home where he's been loved and cared for since that time.

I'm going to turn this story over to Kay and let her tell you about what other surgeries this poor boy has been through...

Kay: Roamy was extremely well cared for in his new foster home. Over the next few months he continued with issues from the ear surgery area- swelling, drainage and infection, followed by rounds of antibiotics. Another surgery was done to close a hole at the base of his ear, and a drain was put in to facilitate healing and redirect the drainage. He was also switched to sweet potato and salmon food to help with his itching. He had a series of medicated baths which also helped with his skin issues.

At the beginning of this year, his issues flared up again; infection and swelling. We were sent to MedVet in Worthington for a surgical consultation. Once again the ear canal was opened up and cleaned out. Roamy and I went to MedVet every couple of days for the next 2 weeks to have his dressings changed- thus the blue "helmet" you see in the picture. Every visit had Roamy waltzing in, tail wagging and laying on the floor on his back awaiting belly rubs. Needless to say everyone at MedVet loved Roamy!

We can't thank enough the doctors and techs for their expert care over the last 2 years. Roamy owes so much to MedVet; his life seems to have returned to normal thanks to the medical intervention and the loving care provided by his foster parents, Pannee and Gary McKinley.

They report the following:

Roamy Today

- sleeps with a toy in his mouth (usually a soft ball) and continues mouthing it even during sleep.
- likes to chew crushed ice.
- attacks (playfully) his big puppy when he comes in from being outside.
- sleeps in a king size bed.
- will roll onto his back in order to get his belly scratched even when meeting a stranger for the first time. He will do the same action when Pannee is brushing him
- is very obedient but tricky even when you're watching him. However if you don't pay attention to him and take your eyes off of him he will go exploring. He has a very inquisitive nature.
- has to take his medicines with peanut butter; even if you try to hide it in his food his tongue is very educated and you will find pills left in the bowl.
- has a built in clock and he knows when it's time to eat or take his medicine with the peanut butter of course and when he needs to go out and when it's time for his brushing. He will sit in front of you or lay down in front of you and stare at you with his beady eyes until you figure out what it is he wants. I tell Pannee that he's putting the whammy on me.
- likes to take walks around the block. But during the day his favorite pastime is napping with his toys (puppy, Tyger, and balls)
- sleeps on a quilt with a large pillow at the front end covered by a very nice soft manta.
- does not get into trash cans, toilet paper or anything else. You can leave food or treats laying around and he will not touch them. We can leave him in the house alone and come back and everything is untouched. (I wouldn't leave anything in his food bowl because I am sure it would be gone)
- does not bark even if other dogs are barking at him. He does play nice with others but his normal take is to just put up with them. Sorta like aristocratic.
- does not get on the furniture unless you throw his ball on the couch for example and he will jump up and retrieve it.
- will try to interrupt Pannee when she is using her stair climber. He takes one of his soft balls and tries to slip it under her pedals.
- has a built in clock. He promptly goes to sleep at 8:30 pm. So you have to have everything completed by that time, dinner, treats, brushing, belly scratches and his medicines. If not out comes the WHAMMY!

GEGRR Update *by Kay Hirsch*

If you are thinking that this is the only newsletter you've seen this year, you are correct. It has taken this long to gather enough stories to create one. I feel like I badger members for stories, but then we all get busy and this request isn't at the top of the to-do list. Remember, any update on a GEGRR Golden and a picture are what we are hoping for...Golden owners love to hear about other Golden!

Most important is the rescue update. As of this writing, we have taken in 39 Golden Retrievers. The age range is 7 weeks to 12 years. 12 Females, 27 Males, and 22 were spayed or neutered. We have had a higher number of trips to MedVet in Worthington and Vet Medical Specialists in Pittsburgh than I ever remember... more serious health issues and surgeries. We have adopted 33 Golden Retrievers into new homes and taken 4 into long term foster for chronic medical reasons. Our mission continues.

The most exciting news to share is the generous gift of a new holiday card from Stan and Heather Darling. As you can see elsewhere in this issue, the card features a beautiful Golden with snowflakes. This card would be good for use all winter. If you haven't bought cards in past years, some of those editions are still available. This is our main fundraiser, so please buy some of these beautiful cards and brighten someone's day by sharing a Golden moment with them.

Roscoe had to eat a special dog-food which was very expensive. We took care of all his medical needs.

In December 2014 Roscoe stopped eating and was given I V fluids. He felt better for a few days, but his health kept declining.

We made the decision to peacefully let him go. He was surrounded by many people who loved him.

I wanted to tell you about Roscoe, because you make it possible for GEGRR to take care of Golden Retrievers like him, for us to love him, to care for him and to be able to meet his medical needs.

Phil and Ilene had the perfect setup for us. Two tents, a dog bath with hot and cold water and another hose for larger dog.

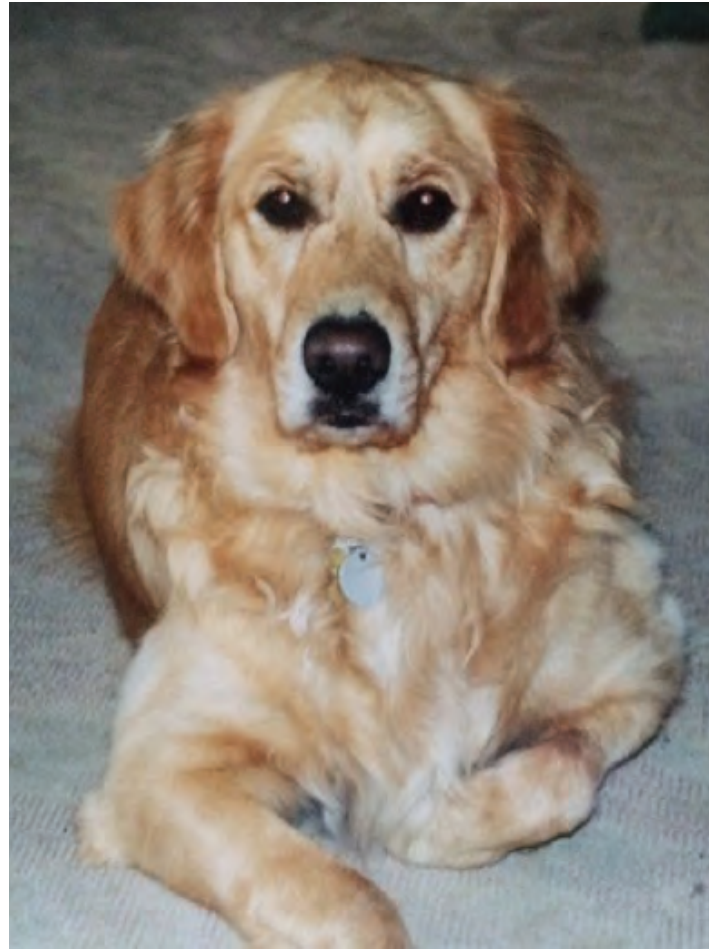

Another Crawford Medical Fund Success Story

Poor Charlie has had a rough few days but seems to be on the mend - thanks to the wonderful staff at MedVet. I took Charlie to his regular vet Friday morning as he had been heavy breathing all night and I assumed it was due to a pinched nerve around his neck as he didn't want to lift his head.

The vet took him back for x-rays and discovered he had air in his chest cavity where it isn't supposed to be and his left lung was struggling to expand. She had to shave him (band around him about 1' in his midsection) and drain 2 liters of air to make it safe for us to transport him to MedVet. He had a horrible ride to MedVet and actually was almost not breathing upon arrival - they had to come out to the car with 4 drs/technicians and squeeze air/oxygen into him to get him safe to get out of the car.

His chest filled up with air again (a couple times) and they determined that he had something called spontaneous pneumothorax. It is really uncommon and typically occurs when a dog has had an injury such as being hit by a car. There is no known reason for this to occur to Charlie as he sure hasn't had an injury or been hit by a car or someone.

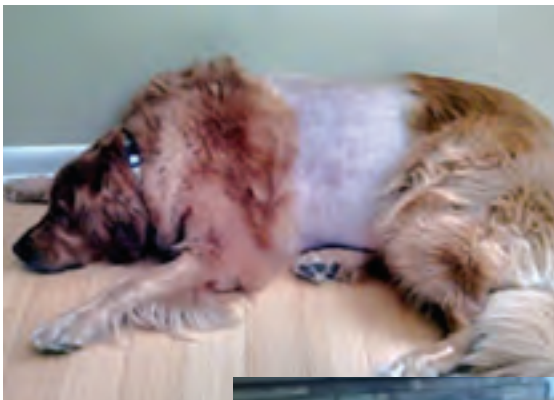
He had surgery Saturday morning and they found two holes in his left lung. They removed approximately 1/3 of his left lung (lobes - not sure?) where the holes were. He was still leaking a little air through a chest tube yesterday post surgery and they were a little worried but that has stopped. And the magic of modern medicine - we went and saw him today and he is breathing so much better already!!! He looks pretty bad - it's a significant wound opening and there are lots of drains and ports all over him. As the Dr had explained - he is going to look worse than he is - he probably feels 100% better than he did as he can breathe better now. After he fully recovers (3 weeks) there are no long term effects from having this missing portion of this lungs. He may never run a marathon but he wasn't going to do this anyways :)

My gut says he won't be ready to come home tomorrow (Monday) as he still isn't eating but I am betting on Tuesday. My wonderful neighbors are ready to build a ramp if needed to help him get in and out of the house as I do think that will be a struggle for a week or so.

That Charlie is a fighter - he really wants to be here with all of us - probably to eat those things he isn't supposed to and most definitely to hang out with his best friend, Molly and all of you :)

Anyway - thank you all for your thoughts and well wishes the past couple days. They have worked and Charlie is recovering well :)

He is home and doing amazingly well :) He has made it down the street to see his honorary Park Overlook grandparents. They give him treats - he has priorities straight of course :) He can climb the front steps at my house with no problem - no need for a ramp.

He hadn't been eating at the vet nor for me yesterday, but just now ate some of his own food- and Molly's. (Another sign he is back on the mend as this boy loves his food!)

He's sleeping a lot and still a little wobbly due to the pain meds probably. Absolutely no problems breathing - in fact he is probably breathing easier than he has been since I have known him. He slept all night next to my bed and every time I looked at him, he had at least one paw touching Molly. This morning he slept with his head on her hind end.

Entropion is the rolling inward of the eyelids, which causes the eyelashes to rub the eye. The eyelashes causes irritation, friction and terrible pain, which can lead to eye ulcers and blindness.

All of these babies will have surgery to correct the problem and not have a lifetime of pain. GEGRR depends on your support and donations for problems like this.

Treasurer's Report

I have been involved with Golden Endings since Kay and I first went to Ralph's to wash Golden Retrievers in 2000. For years I have assisted Bill Johnston with analysis of operating income and expenses.

Financially, 2014 was a break-even year. The operating results are always driven by the expense side of the equation, with Pet Care being the focus. The cost of veterinary care, food and kenneling (\$67,525) was 88% of our total spending (\$76,681). The next highest expense was Printing (newsletters and Calendar) at \$3,539.

We rely on contributions to subsidize dues and fees collected by operations. You can see how important our fundraising efforts are by considering the sources of our income:

Looking forward, we know that veterinary care costs will continue to rise. And, if trends continue, we will see more senior Golden Retrievers coming in that have more chronic medical conditions. We must sustain our efforts to raise funds through solicitations, sales, and volunteer efforts such as bookwrapping.

Our annual dues letter will be sent in December. You can donate and contribute to the Crawford Fund while paying your dues, and you can opt for the electronic version of the newsletter (color pictures!). Please add your e-mail address and note any changes to your contact info.

The Kroger Cares program is a painless way for you to help us. Thanks to Cathy Taylor, we have received quarterly contributions for years, amounting to thousands of dollars...at no cost to the shoppers. For GEGRR to benefit, you must have a Kroger Plus card, and when you use it when checking out at Kroger, your purchases accumulate as points that are used to determine Kroger's contribution to Golden Endings. 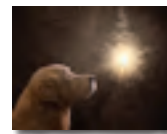
